Some Safety Issues to Consider

- Comply with personal and environmental safety practices associated with clothing; eye protection; hand tools; power equipment; proper ventilation; and the handling, storage, and disposal of chemicals/materials in accordance with local, state, and federal safety and environmental regulations.
- Shop rules and procedures are critical to your safety. Please give these your utmost attention.
- Marked safety areas play an important role in maintaining a safe work environment. Always understand and heed marked safety areas.
- Fire blankets are an important component of fire safety in the shop. Always know their location, purpose, and use.
- Fire extinguishers come in a variety of types and sizes. It pays to understand the differences before they are needed.
- Eye wash stations are an important component of shop safety. Always know their location, purpose, and use.
- Pre-planned evacuation routes are an important component of shop safety. Always know the location of all evacuation routes for your shop.
- Being able to locate information in an SDS is critical to your safety and health. Make sure you are familiar with their location and use.

Performance Standard
